'An Adsummonites Dream,' a sketch of a new bug (Kemble), his maiden aunt (C. W. Raeburn) and Bulldozer, a head monitor (D. A. Raeburn), at 'a tea-place near Godalming,' was full of well-written dialogue and cleverly conceived situation. C. W. Raeburn acted with immense verve and no little skill. 'In the Mood,' a seriously sentimental interlude played by Chevis, was also well conceived, though extremely difficult to put across successfully in the middle of such a light bill of fare. It is to the credit of Chevis that he succeeded in holding the attention of the audience by his obvious sincerity.

Meanwhile the entertainment had been interrupted by the intrusion of a certain Colonel Sir Pompet ffolliott-Brompton (Waddell), who delivered a very remarkable lecture on military affairs. Over this tour de force, for it was nothing less, it is impossible not to enthuse. The shafts of satire were polished and pointed, yet never barbed. The voice, the little mannerisms, the fatuous inconsequentialities, were all studied to perfection. This was, in truth,

'very excellent fooling.'

The Revue as a whole was marked by spontaneity and liveliness. If the chief honours went to Waddell, the two Raeburns, the Mavroleon brothers and to a lesser extent Wackerbarth, (who had no part in which he could do himself justice), Kemble and Chevis, all showed considerable versatility and ability, whilst Moy compèred the show with a delightfully unexpected suavity. To Messrs. Wackerbarth, Moy and Darvall, who staged and produced the Revue, very high praise is due for a thoroughly enjoyable evening.

#### CHARTERHOUSE CONSERVATIVE SOCIETY

When we discovered in the course of an unsatisfactory debate last quarter that an unpleasantly large minority of the School were not Conservatives and that a majority of those who professed to be Conservatives did not understand the principles and aims they accepted, we decided to form a Conservative Society which should further the Conservative cause by means of lectures, debates and any other means practicable. We wrote to the headquarters of the Conservative and Unionist Parties and received a most gratifying reply, wishing us success and stating that, so far as was known, this was the first occasion such a society has been formed at a public school.

We have at the moment several vacancies on the Committee and can give ordinary membership to an almost unlimited number. Those who are interested and who can accept, in the main, the Conservative beliefs should apply to the Chairman, Mr Rees-Mogg, to the Vice-Chairman, Mr Reiss, or to Mr Raven. We shall hold open meetings, among which we hope to include lectures by prominent Conserva-tives, but we shall also hold private meetings, apart from those which are purely committee meetings, to which members of the Society only will be invited.

### CHARTERHOUSE v ETON

Away. June 13th. Won by 4 wickets.

This was the first victory over Eton since 1939 when Charterhouse, scoring 302 by three o'clock, succeeded in dismissing the whole Eton side for 178. Since then several exciting matches have been played; and this wartime match had its thrilling moments in spite of the low scores on both sides.

Overnight rain, which lasted till eleven o'clock, had made the pitch and outfield soft and wet, so the Eton captain, on winning the toss, decided rightly to bat. His opening pair, however, although batting stylishly, did not attempt to attack the bowling while the ball was wet and difficult to hold. These were fatal tactics: for the sun, once it began to dry the pitch, made it more and more difficult every minute. Credit must of course be given to Ashley and Day, who kept a steady length under these conditions. In fact, when Day was replaced by Rimell mi. he had bowled six overs with a wettish ball and only 10 runs had been scored off him.

The wicket now suited Rimell's spinners. In his first over, Blake was 1-b-w; in his second, Gardiner-Hill was out in a peculiar manner, the wicket-keeper diving between the batman's legs and the bat to catch the ball just before it reached the ground!

Then White was brilliantly caught and bowled by Ashley, making the score after nearly an hour's play 22 for three. When the players went in to lunch this total had been doubled, thanks to some bright hitting by the Hely-Hutchinsons.

After lunch the wicket appeared to help the bowlers, especially Rimell mi., who, flighting and spinning the ball cleverly, baffled the majority of the Etonians. At the other end Ashley was bowling with venom and accuracy and, faced by this relentless double attack, the batsmen never felt really comfortable. At three o'clock the score was only 83 with seven wickets down. A splendid hit for six by Stewart-Grey was the only incident worth recording in the rest of the Eton innings.

In reply to the modest score of 98, Charterhouse lost three men for 19, but by dint of careful play the two youngest members of the team, Rimell mi. and May, pulled the game round and at tea-time, with the scoreboard showing 35 for

three, the game was in an interesting stage.

Fortunately there was not an early wicket after tea and 48 was reached without further loss. Then Rimell ma. took his brother's place and a beautiful lofty hit for six off the first ball he received showed that he and Charterhouse were determined to win. And his strling innings, in which he smacked every loose ball with considerable vigour and confidence, really decided the issue. May was run out at 59 after making a valuable contribution and Cranstoun partnered Rimell ma. These two took the score to 86 when Eton's hopes were raised by the dismissal of Rimell ma., only to be lowered immediately by four byes which sent the total bouncing up to 90! In spite of some excellent ground fielding the remaining few runs were obtained comfortably by Walters and Cranstoun.

But the victory was really due to the Carthusian bowlers. Ashley's strenuous work is best judged by his analysis; except for the last over before lunch, he bowled throughout the innings, taking four wickets for 24 runs in 22 overs, an astounding performance under such conditions. Rimell mi. took six Eton wickets for 57 runs, one of his best and most valuable achievements in a match of this importance. His brother had a great day; besides his gallant knock,

he kept magnificently, allowing only one bye.

## CHARTERHOUSE v HARROW

The weather and pitch were all that could be desired when Charterhouse began their innings at 11.50, but another bad start has to be recorded; for both Funnell and Carter were out with only 13 runs scored! Walters, promoted in the batting order, came in to play one of his best innings, while May, batting in his own inimitable style, forcing the ball away cleverly on the leg side, helped him so adequately that 70 runs were added in 45 minutes.

Even when Walters was out and Rimell mi. came in, the rate of scoring increased, and at one o'clock the spectators clapped the 'hundred up' and May's fifty. Though trying hard, the Harrovians could not stop the fluency with which these two young batsmen scored. It was a delightful exhibition of batting. Once or twice every over the ball sped swiftly across Green to the boundary, vainly chased by some luckless Harrovian. The fielders must surely have welcomed lunch at 1.25, when the score was 150 for three wickets after 95 minutes' play.

May and Rimell mi. continued to bat well after the interval and May went on to complete his first century for Charterhouse—an entertaining innings which will long be remembered by those who saw it. Incidentally his partnership with Rimell mi. had also realized 100. Soon afterwards May was caught in the slips but with the total already at 197, Charter-

house were in a winning position.

Then, however, came a collapse, an anti-climax, as it were, to the brilliant performances of Walters, Rimell mi. and May. Rimell did, indeed, stay a little longer, but all the rest of the side, except Bishop, were sent back to the Pavilion at regular and short intervals. Responsibility for this was shared by the two Harrovian bowlers, McCorquodale and McClean, who bowled with great spirit and energy despite hot gruelling spells on the sun-baked Green.

Harrow were eventually set a stiff but not impossible task, considering the fast wicket and outfield. Unfortunately, Harrow's chances of victory were dissipated in the usual hour's play before tea. A score of 42 for two was not good enough, for it meant that, with eight wickets in hand, 210 runs were needed in about an hour and three-quarters.

Could Charterhouse, on the other hand, dismiss Harrow in the time available on such a good wicket? Unhappily, although bowling an immaculate length, Ashley, injured a day or two previously, was not as deadly as usual: although he kept the runs down, he could not take the much needed wickets. Whitby, a young newcomer to the side, bowled with spirit however, and met with fair success, taking three wickets for 30 runs.

At 5.45, that is, with an hour and a quarter left for play, five Harrovians were out for 74 runs and victory for Charterhouse seemed a probability. At this juncture Jackson and Spring-Rice became associated and played with such confidence against the change bowlers that sixty good runs were put on before the Rimell mi. combination parted them an hour later. Another quick wicket raised hopes which did not materialize, however, and the match ended in a rather tame draw.

The chief features of the match were May's century and his partnership with Rimell mi. These two put Charterhouse in a winning position, but the rest of the side failed to take the fullest advantage of their efforts. For Harrow, McCorquodale's fast bowling and Jackson's courageous innings deserve pride of place.
