

in an hour of mortal danger, when every red-blooded man would think only of selling his life dearly, the directors would sit down to analyse and discuss their several motives. Nor is it conceivable that a man who has been manufacturing robots for years would still be dependent on a written formula, or that, if he were, he would not save his life and those of his companions by palming off on the enemy a bogus prescription whose worthlessness could not be proved before the authors of the fraud had made good their escape. And why, one wonders, did not the scrupulous Alquist save his conscience by severing his connexion with the company long before the final catastrophe?

The fact is that 'R.U.R.' is not a play, but a philosophic treatise in dramatic form. Logically it should end after Act III with the extinction of the human race. The fourth act is a tedious anticlimax in which the *deus ex machina* takes a more than usually clumsy hand. It provided Raeburn ma, however, with the opportunity of giving the best performance of the evening. The other non-robots, handicapped by a make-up that did nothing to mitigate the juvenility of their figures and faces, struggled hard with varying degrees of success to put some vitality into parts that would tax the powers of the most experienced players. Woollcombe was not very happily cast for the part of the General Manager, but his manner and confidence improved as the play went on, and as a feat of memory alone his performance was a remarkable achievement. By again stepping in to fill a sudden gap Jasmine Holmes supplied the charm of a genuine feminine touch. Raeburn mi. made a satisfactory lady's maid: he would have been better still, had he been less angular: old retainers are not necessarily crippled with rheumatism. Randall played to perfection the part of a robotess, and Priestland was a most impressive and terrifyingly sinister RADIUS. Dehn and Palmer as robots experiencing the first faint thrills of human affection skilfully suggested the final stages of their emergence from a purely mechanical state. Among the minor human characters Hunter was perhaps the most outstanding.

The robot costumes were effective in their simplicity, and the specially designed scenery was admirable. From the failure of the footlights to go on when the actors came forward for their call we draw the reassuring conclusion that our Greenroom electricians, for all their customary super-efficiency, are not really robots, but fallible mortals, capable, like the rest of us, of occasional lapses.

This was a disappointing match. Having dismissed Wellington for 202 runs, Charterhouse could only score 144 for 7 in two and a half hours' play. Furthermore, two simple catches, one at mid-off, and one at mid-on, were dropped before lunch: mistakes which had a serious bearing on the result. Otherwise, the Charterhouse fielding was good, particularly the catch which ended Woollocombe's innings.

Wellington batted well and at one time it looked as if they would be in a position to declare: but Ashley coming on to bowl again took three wickets in three overs and the innings was soon over. In fact Ashley had bowled well, his final figures being 19 overs, 39 runs, 5 wickets; Rimell mi. also took two very useful wickets before lunch with his slow off-breaks.

Charterhouse made a bad start, losing Carter and both Rimells for 25 runs to Woollocombe's clever slow bowling. A good stand by Crole-Rees and Oram stopped the rot but the batsmen were subdued by the steady bowling and excellent fielding of the visitors, and gradually Charterhouse lost their chances of victory. Drury was sound but much too slow, and although Williams and Watson threw their wickets away in an effort to force the pace the match ended in a disappointing draw.

The wicket was easy-paced after over-night rain and gave no help to the Carthusian fast bowlers. Winchester's strong batting side seemed to revel in these conditions and gave an entertaining and enterprising display. A fine stand by Doggart and Webb put them in a sound position: for the lunch score of 95 for 3 was raised to 131 before Doggart was given out l-b-w to Rimell mi. Webb, his young partner, continued to bat beautifully, making well-timed square-cuts as well as off-drives and an occasional forcing shot to leg. His 75 not out was one of the best innings played on Green this season. Soon after four o'clock Doggart declared, giving Charterhouse less than two and a half hours to score 224 runs.

Although the wicket had dried out by now Charterhouse began badly once more: the procession of the Eton match was repeated; only Williams showing any confidence against some competent bowling and fielding. With eight wickets down for 46 and defeat in sight, Dalgety and Ashley defied the attack for a considerable period and, although Ashley was bowled at 68, Day, by surviving the last few overs, helped Dalgety to stave off defeat.

The wicket, though fairly fast, was on the 'sporting side' and helped all the bowlers. In spite of this Bradfield managed to score 95 for 4 by lunch. After lunch the Bradfield tail failed to wag against some excellent fast bowling by Watson, who, helped by the wind and the pitch, moved the ball about in a most disconcerting manner and took seven wickets for 28.

The usual bad start and the peculiar wicket seemed to shake the morale of the Charterhouse side; Funnell, Crole-Rees, Watson and both Rimells failed and but for Carter's defensive innings the disaster would have been even worse. Williams and Bishop, however, stopped the rot and from 40 for 6 the score moved to 59 before Williams was dismissed. Ashley defended stoutly and with Dalgety scoring an occasional boundary, it looked at this period as if the 20-odd runs needed for victory would be obtained.
