CHARTERHOUSE v SURREY COLTS

For the fifth successive match Charterhouse fielded first and soon had the Colts in trouble. Before the score reached double figures, three wickets had fallen, two of them to Bendit. Then Thoday was joined by Constable, who was confident from the start and looked set for a long innings. However, he mistimed a ball from Bendit and was l-b-w when only 24 runs had been scored. The only long partnership of the innings was between Thoday and Gollan, who added 50 runs before the former was caught after an innings of 44 in which he had several narrow escapes. The seventh wicket partnership between the two lefthanders, Gollan and Longman, lasted a long time but did not advance the score very much, and soon after Longman was run out the innings closed for 101, Bendit having taken 5 for 35.

Almost immediately after the tea interval the first Charterhouse wicket fell when Lomas was l-b-w to Wildbore. When Crole-Rees and Sword both left, the former unluckily seized with cramp and the latter caught in the slips, with only 21 runs scored, it looked as though Charterhouse might be hard put to it to pull the game round. However, Lovett and Evans came to the rescue and their partnership produced 60 runs and some anxious moments for the spectators. Both batsmen played some forcing shots but were occasionally beaten by Constable's off-breaks. In the end a smart catch by Wix dismissed Evans, leaving only 20 runs to be scored, and these were soon knocked

CHARTERHOUSE V OLD CARTHUSIANS

At Home. July 11th. Won by 102 runs.

The Old Carthusians won the toss and put the School in, in conformity rather with war-time practice than with the principles of cricket. After a month of dry weather, a steady day's rain on Friday had produced a slow wicket, which remained lifeless and easy all day. Crole-Rees and Lomas started slowly; no doubt the sudden change from fast wickets made them cautious, but even so too many short balls were allowed to go unpunished. Lomas played well: he is a much improved player and his weakness against slow bowling is less marked than it was last year. Walker, Acheson-Gray and Lovett were all out just when they seemed to have settled down, and with 5 of the School out for 101 the Old Carthusians had no reason to be dissatisfied. But Sword upset all their calculations: he started shakily and was twice distinctly lucky, but after he had passed 50 his batting was of a high class. He is not an impressive player to look at—he is slow on his feet and his bat is rarely straight—but he never lets off a bad ball, and his ability to score off good ones and in particular his power of forcing the ball wide of mid-on are signs of a very dangerous batsman.

The Old Carthusian bowling, apart from Jackson and Goodfellow, was poor: Goodfellow's was a marvellous performance for a man of 53 playing his first game for 12 months. Jackson bowled unchanged from 12.15 to 3.15 and was always dangerous: that so good a bowler should have failed to get into the eleven is convincing evidence of the standard of recent Charterhouse sides. The fielding was perhaps the worst ever produced by an Old Carthusian side: only those who remember how vilely some of the otherwise extremely strong Friar sides of the nineteen-thirties fielded will appreciate what this means. Lovett left his opponents about two hours and twenty minutes to get the runs and they never looked like doing it. Most of the batting was inexpressibly feeble, and only Larking could fairly put down his dismissal to the wicket. Hawley alone, in his first innings for three years, played really well, though the tail struggled bravely. wicket was too slow for Acheson-Gray, who, anyhow, bowled too many bad balls, and the real damage was done by Bendit, who bowled finely. He has a beautiful action, and makes the ball rise sharply and often run away in the most disconcerting fashion from the batsman. Lomas's catch in the deep and Sword's in the slips were both of the highest class. Robinites won by 94 runs.

Lovett won the toss and chose to bat. Carter appeared uncomfortable to the bowling of Sword and Westerman and soon gave a difficult chance to slip. Runs were hard to come by and it came as no surprise when Carter was bowled by Westerman. The bowlers were keeping a steady length and Westerman particularly, and Lovett nibbling on the off. At 39, after having Lovett dropped, Sword was rewarded with Bishop's wicket, who had played a safe but unenterprising innings. Williams tried to brighten up the game, but when he and Drury left in quick succession, Robinites were in a sorry position. Lovett and Popplewell, however, defended stoutly for the twenty minutes that remained, and stumps were drawn at 86 for 4, Lovett being 40 and Popplewell 7.

On the second day they continued to bat with assurance, and had added 60 for the partnership before Lovett was bowled. That his innings of 68 should include 33 singles is an indication of his restraint and the accuracy of the bowling. Popplewell followed immediately for an invaluable 21. Dalgety was soon run out and the Saunderites' outlook became more hopeful. But Maslin revived the situation for Robinites by smacking Sykes for two sixes and a four. He continued to hit hard, and when he was caught had made 32 out of 47. The innings closed for 180, a formidable enough total.

Westerman was the most successful bowler and conceded only 47 runs in 28 overs. Apart from rejected chances in the slips the fielding was of a high standard: Sword set an excellent example and his astute captaincy saved many runs.

On the third day Robertson and Le Bas gave Saunderites a shaky start. Lovett was bowling to an array of slips, but the batsmen (through no lack of trying) could not get a touch. At last Robertson was 1-b-w, and in the next over Le Bas played on to Williams, who was swinging the ball an appreciable distance. Sykes and Sword then played more confidently, but at 23 Sykes was well caught at the wicket. It was evident that Saunderites stood or fell with Sword, and victory was a distinct possibility if he could find a partner to stay. But first Westerman was out, and then Walters who had seemed the most likely to give his captain the necessary support. Then at 51 Sword was himself caught off Williams for a brave innings that emphasized the weakness of the rest of the side.

After that, though Waddell ma. and Prior held out for a while, the match drifted to its close, and Saunderites were out for 86.

Lovett and Williams bowled intelligently, while the fielding gave nothing away; but the Saunderite batsmen seemed overawed from the start. It is interesting to note that in their innings 20 overs, or 40 per cent. of the 53 bowled, were maidens.

REVIEW OF THE SEASON

The 1942 XI made cricket history at Charterhouse, for, out of twelve matches played, seven were won and five drawn. This unbeaten record is one of which they can be proud, for they proved themselves superior to every School side they met; even the much-vaunted Etonian XI, claimed by some critics to be the best Public School side of the year (probably because of their victory over Winchester), only managed to escape defeat by the narrowest of margins. Harrow were beaten by seven wickets. The new war-time fixtures with Tonbridge and Bradfield both ended in a five-wicket victory for Charterhouse. Rain caused the

Wellington match to be abandoned when everything seemed to be in our favour. The Winchester fixture has been cancelled till after the war.

The comparative strength of the side was acknowledged by the selection of three of its members, Lovett, Acheson-Gray and Sword, to play for the Rest at Lord's. This does not mean that the XI owed its success to the efforts of these three alone: Bendit, Lomas, Walker, Stevenson and Dalgety also share the credit. To Lovett, however, is due the team-work; his inspiring and skilful leadership welded his men into a cohesive and happy unit, always confident and always giving of their best.

The averages show that the bowling was as good as, if not better than, the batting. Dalgety's wicket-keeping was more than efficient, and the fielding of the side was always sound and occasionally brilliant.

Bendit, Stevenson and Acheson-Gray bore the brunt of the bowling: the former, who has successfully adopted the easy yet effective style of his professional coach, has final figures which speak for themselves. His best feats were six for 26 against the Old Carthusians and five for 29 against Tonbridge. Stevenson, bowling in-swingers off the wrong foot, deceived many a good batsman: his best performances being six for 43 against Harrow, and four for 44 against Bradfield. Acheson-Gray revelled in the slower wickets in May and June, and especially at Eton, where his slow off-spinners took five wickets for 28 runs. Once again Lovett and Sword were extremely useful bowlers when required; Lovett, for instance, taking five for 21 at Wellington and three for 22 against Bradfield.

Sword and Lovett were the most successful batsmen. Sword, incidentally the only player to score a century, batted beautifully on many occasions. When he is in form, his perfect timing and variety of strokes are a delight to watch. Lovett, who, like T. R. Garnett and J. G. Larking, was an excellent judge of a run, played several superb innings; his best was probably a captain's knock in the Bradfield match when, going in at a critical moment, he dominated the game till it was won. Walker, potentially one of the best bats in the side, finished the season with an average of thirty, in spite of a bad patch early on. Lomas proved an ideal opening batsmen; and to him is due a good deal of the success obtained by the later batsmen. He played especially well against the Etonian swing bowlers. Acheson-Gray also batted soundly at Eton, where his 45 was a valuable contribution to the Charterhouse score. Evans soon earned his place as a forcing bat of great possibilities and as a fielder better than the average. The experience gained by Drury and Crole-Rees should stand them in good stead in next year's side, which is to be captained by Dalgety.
