had some pretension to good breeding. It was scarcely appropriate therefore for Snake, who manifestly belonged to the underworld, to play the exquisite courtier in the opening scene. The saying, 'Clothes make the man,' is only partially true, and the abject sneak of the last act was a more convincing portrait. It might be argued also that Joseph Surface was too deliberate in his asides. So inveterate a hypocrite would scarcely pause to analyse his motives or to reflect on the part he ought to play. Sheridan followed the fashion of his time in using soliloquy as an aid to the less intelligent part of his audience, but it was a clumsy device that hinders the actor more than it helps him: it should therefore be obscured rather than emphasized. Such blemishes, however,—if indeed they are blemishes—are an almost negligible factor in a production that gave immense pleasure to everyone who saw it and reflects the highest credit on everyone who took part in it. We thank them all for a delightful evening.

Exceptionally heavy rain on the morning of the match delayed the start till after lunch, and it was obvious that the side winning the toss and batting first would have a considerable advantage, for the bowlers would have trouble in getting a firm foothold and also in controlling a wet ball.

In spite of this the bowlers and the fielders kept the runs down and Winchester scored only fifty runs in the first hour for the loss of Maynard. By then the wicket, drying quickly under the effect of wind and sun, began to be so difficult that even the best Wykhamist batsmen could not cope with the varying height and speed of the good-length bowling of Perry, Aitchison and Rimell. Indeed, the last-named added cunning flight and spin to the other difficulties and the side were all out by tea-time for the small total of 102. Baines was the only later batsman to have any success in these peculiar conditions. Perry bowled one memorable over, dismissing three batsmen in four balls.

The heavy roller made the pitch easier for a time and Perry was sent in with Raven to score quickly. This he did to the best of his ability in spite of the sudden disasters at the other end, where Raven was stumped off the wicket-keeper's pads in the first over and Whitby was completely defeated by an in-swinger from Macdonnel. But May and Perry scored freely, taking the score to 29 before Perry was cleverly stumped by Baines.

Further calamities followed—Rimell and Popplewell were both dismissed without scoring—and with 37 for 5 on the board Carthusian hopes now rested on May, who was playing a careful innings on this sticky wicket. Every loose ball, however, he hit very hard, but the well-placed fielders stopped many a promising drive. Then a magnificent catch by Macdonnel at short extra-cover dashed these hopes. The remaining batsmen offered only temporary resistance and an interesting match, dominated by the condition of the pitch, ended in a win for Winchester by 38 runs.

Both sides produced excellent fielding and first-class wicket-keeping. The Charterhouse bowling seemed to have more variety and a better length, but the visitors' slight superiority in fielding and batting added to the advantage gained from winning the toss gave them their victory.
