for objects not permanently on exhibition. At the same time it was decided to continue the rearrangement and remounting of the British birds, including the Stafford collection. This has now been completed—except for internal lighting of the cases—and all four walls of the Natural History Section show the birds collected into families in their natural surroundings. The 'properties' are a monu-ment to the skill and ingenuity of the present Curator, Mr. P. J. Mountney, and the backgrounds were in many cases painted by boys in the School. There are still gaps: specimens of Warblers, Housemartins, Sandmartins and Wagtails would be very welcome.

Last quarter Museum was offered, and very gladly accepted, by W. H. Hale (S. 1921-26) the loan of the magnificent collection of eggs of British birds found by his late father, the Rev. J. R. Hale (S. 1888-92), together with four cabinets of British Lepidoptera. The former collection especially calls for a more detailed note. It fills nine large cabinets, with three additional ones of duplicates. Every specimen in it was collected by J. R. Hale (some while he was a boy at Charterhouse), by his sons, W. H. and J. P. R. Hale (S. 1923-28) or by his friends T. P. Aldworth and E. V. Earle. Only three birds regularly nesting in the British Isles are unrepresented—Snow Bunting, Bittern and Montague's Harrier. Especially noteworthy are the eggs of the Hobby, Ducks, Owls, Kentish Plover, Chaffinch, Robin, Crested Tit, Marsh Harrier and Red-necked Philacope. The collection of Lepidoptera is smaller, but includes most of the British butterflies (notably Clouded Yellow, var. Helice, and a genuine English Camberwell Beauty) and the commoner moths. The fender and his brother are the fourth successive generation of Carthusian Hales and the fifth is due at Charterhouse shortly.

Lack of space has made it necessary to limit future additions to the Natural History section to British specimens, with the possible exception of the completion of the large collection of heads of African game given by Dr. Percy Rendall.

In the Archæological Section Professor Beazley has recently identified a Greek Calyx (bought by the Rev. G. S. Davies) as the work of the potter Hieron and the painter Makron. There is great congestion in this section also, but it is hoped There is great congestion in this section also, but it is hoped that the pictures, at present most inadequately shown, may in not too distant future join last quarter's munificent gift of over fifty paintings made to Charterhouse by W. V. Paterson (g. 1874-5) in a separate Art Gallery. The many other recent gifts cannot be mentioned here. They are duly recorded in the book kept for the purpose in

Museum.

Having won the toss, Harrow sent Charterhouse in to bat on a slowish wicket. The weather looked ominous, but the experts said it would not rain before six o'clock.

Aitchison and Raven opened at 11.40 and by soon after twelve o'clock, thanks to some spirited batting by Raven and Spargo, the score was 29 for 2. It was gratifying to see that the Carthusians had sized up the situation and, in spite of some good in-swing bowling by Arnott, the score mounted fast. Spargo was out at 12.20 and May and Rimell began one of their profitable stands. They both played beautiful cricket and hit the ball very hard—which is needed if boundaries are to be scored on the peculiarly shaped Harrow ground. Lunch at one o'clock found them still together. The 100 went up and then 150, and then Williams, having got 50, was caught off Whitaker, and Rimell, having reached his century, gave Byrt a well-deserved wicket. Except for Jones, Weekites put up little more defence to Whitaker and Meyer and at 208 they declared, leaving Robinites 35 minutes' play.

By the end of the evening, Robinites had lost 4 wickets for 19 runs. Resuming the next day, Popplewell and Albu played a cautious game, scoring slowly until Albu was out at 47. Inigo-Jones joined Popplewell, who proceeded to keep the bowling entirely to himself by skilful stealing of runs. In this way runs came and Robinite position improved steadily. CRICKET, 1945

The last war-time eleven had a proud record and, in School matches, defeated Harrow, Wellington, Tonbridge and Bradfield, lost to Winchester and drew with Eton, a match which was abandoned because of rain.

Ably led by Rimell, the side met with early success; for both Wellington and Tonbridge were beaten by eight wickets before the second week in June, and on June 9th Bradfield were overcome by another large margin. The bowling had such length, control and variety that most sides were dismissed easily and Rimell's difficulty (and anxiety!) was to give as many batsmen as possible a chance to show their mettle. When the earlier batsmen failed, Rimell and May became inevitable partners and almost invariably pulled the game round. However, Raven, Aitchison and Spargo gradually secured their places, the first two as all-rounders and the last as a batsman. With Popplewell as wicket-keeper and with Whitby and Perry as opening bowlers eight certain members of the side were collected. The other three, in spite of exhaustive trials, would not materialize, and in the end colours were awarded to Lynch, Le Bas and Prior, all useful fielders, and Harvey a promising all-rounder. The young players who were tried failed to do themselves justice, but they had valuable experience which should prove useful next year.

The bowling was again strong. Perry and Whitby could bowl fairly fast but, during this abnormally wet season, they rarely found a suitable pitch on which to bowl. However, on the few occasions when it was dry they took their quota of wickets. Rimell, on the other hand, revelling in the slower wickets, proved even more devastating than in previous seasons. In School matches he took six for 10 against both Wellington and Tonbridge, four for 38 at Bradfield and three for 32 against Winchester. Aitchison and Raven also bowled off-spinners, occasionally with success and always with control. Harvey and Le Bas could, if needed, bowl good-length, medium-pace swingers. Thus Rimell had six useful bowlers to call upon in addition to himself.

The batting depended too much on Rimell and May to be really convincing. While these two were extremely reliable, the other official batsmen failed frequently. Rimell played many a business-like innings and went from success to success. His sound yet forceful left-handed play made him the ideal partner for the elegant May, who had another brilliant season and whose natural skill was strengthened this year with experience. It was good to see him learning to place his leg-side shots, while Rimell taught him to run between the wickets. Their partnership against Bradfield, and later on against Harrow, will long be remembered by those present.

Both Raven, who developed into a good opening bat, and Aitchison, who watches the ball well, improved in style and confidence as the season progressed. Besides keeping wicket in good form, Popplewell was capable of playing a stylish innings at any time. Whitby, who likes wickets of Indian speed, did not find many pitches to his liking, but he performed well in the few spells of fine weather which occurred in July. Spargo played a number of effective innings and, on his day, looked like a first-class batsman. Lynch and Prior, though successful in May, failed to come up to expectations. Despite his peculiar style, Harvey made considerable headway during the season and became a useful member of the team, while Perry and Le Bas, given the opportunity, could hit the ball very hard.

The fielding of the side was sound and good without being brilliant. Rimell, May, Aitchison at cover, Harvey, Lynch and Le Bas were probably the best.

Rimell became an intelligent captain and an inspiring leader. Both he and May played at Lord's.

The outlook for 1946 is particularly rosy: six old colours, including Rimell, May, Whitby and Popplewell, hope to be here, and around such a nucleus it should be easy to build a strong peace-time eleven.
