CHARTERHOUSE v BRADFIELD

Away. Wednesday, October 27th. Drawn 0—0.

The match was played in brilliant sunshine after a foggy morning which only relented about half an hour before the game. The ground was therefore slippery on the surface, but firm and fast underneath. Charterhouse, with the sun behind them, opened extremely well, for Whitley nearly scored in the first minute after an excellent move with his inside. For ten minutes Charterhouse were all over their opponents. Bradfield, however, defended heroically, survived

the storm, and gradually settled down to hit back. Throughout the game the Bradfield defence marked very closely and never gave the Charterhouse forwards time to steady themselves before shooting. Charterhouse, meanwhile, were still having more of the game, but once came very near to disaster through a snap-shot by the opposing centre-forward. Several corners were forced but the situation never looked particularly menacing, chiefly owing to the close marking of the Bradfield defence and to the excellence of their goalkeeper, who gave a most competent display throughout. Once or twice Charterhouse did break through, but failed to move fast enough with the ball to make use of their opportunities. Godden ma. often looked dangerous, but his shooting was weak and he tried to shoot while running too fast. Just before half-time Bradfield had their great opportunity, being presented with an open goal after Cross had failed to hold a cross-shot. The ball, however, was spinning and their inside-left missed from close range.

After half-time the game increased in speed and fury, nearly every attack producing immediate break-aways and counter-attacks by the defenders, who often took the ball right down to the other end of the field. Crole-Rees was constantly doing good things, but allowed himself to be jockeyed out to the right with the ball, where he found himself at an almost impossible angle for accurate shooting. Cross had one nasty moment but went down on the ball, discomforting two large Bradfield forwards with his torpedo-attack. As the game progressed the large size of the Charterhouse team began to tell and the situation looked safer but not much more hopeful, except once right at the end of the game when Vlasto was put clear through the middle after clever passing between Godden mi. and Crole-Rees. Vlasto kept his head well and was only baffled by a very good piece of goalkeeping. Several more corners were forced but neither side could score. The second half was really very exciting, for the ball was always travelling up and down the field at great speed. A remarkable effort by Lovesy is worth recording. Caught on the wrong foot he conceded a corner by a full-blooded kick from the half-way line—an almost unique gesture!

For Charterhouse, Godden ma. looked too excited to be really dangerous. Godden mi. played well and made some good openings, as did Crole-Rees. Spratt was not as dangerous as usual, and Vlasto was not quick enough to beat his centre-half. Rimell ma. played well but had his hands full marking Kingsley, the Bradfield captain. Bishop took some twenty minutes to adapt himself to the unusual conditions. Whitley stuck to his man well, but his kicking disintegrated as the game went on. Lovesy kicked well but was rather slow. Williams had a very bad day, and completely missed both ball and back a large number of times. Apart from the fumble which nearly cost a goal, Cross played very coolly and competently.

This match produced another lovely day, but it was cold, and a north wind was blowing straight down the ground. Charterhouse kicked off with the wind and pressed for the majority of the first half. The match was not as exciting as our earlier contest at Bradfield, chiefly owing to the difficulties of clearing the ball and getting it up to the other end against the wind. The Bradfield defence, as usual, marked very closely, and there was customary reluctance among the Charterhouse forwards to shoot and make use of the wind. No attack looked unduly menacing, but the ball was very light and by no means easy to control ; suddenly a Bradfield forward took a shot at a venture and bounced the ball on to the cross-bar from some twenty yards out. Meanwhile, the Charterhouse halves were getting their opposing forwards well under control and began to help in the attack. A good centre by Pollock might have been headed through by Spratt, but eventually the ball came to Crole-Rees on the edge of the penalty-area, after good work by Godden ma. and Whitley on the right—and he, with great deliberation, shot low into the left-hand corner of the goal, giving the goalkeeper very little chance. This proved to be the only goal of the match.

After half-time, Charterhouse played better, and almost immediately after the kick-off the ball came across from

Crole-Rees on the right-wing and found two Charterhouse forwards quite unmarked and very close to goal. Godden mi. seemed so surprised that, in spite of careful concentration, he shot wide. Later, too, a cross-shot from the left and a further shot from one of the inside-forwards hit the Bradfield goalkeeper on his outstretched foot and rebounded harmlessly into play via the cross-bar. When Bradfield did break away they found the ball always running away from them down wind, and several shots went wide through this. All three Charterhouse halves were now playing extremely well and were strangling all movements by the opposition before they got properly under way. The last ten minutes speeded up considerably, but no further score occurred.

For Charterhouse, Lovesy played as well as he has ever done and kicked magnificently. All the halves played very stoutly, and Williams at back gave a much better display than in the previous Bradfield match. The forwards combined very much better but still lack real punch in the penalty-area. Both Godden ma. and Pollock on the wings ran determinedly but their centres were not accurate and there was a tendency to over-shoot.

In the centre, Crole-Rees and Godden mi. both did clever things and opened the game up well, but the former errs through slowness and the latter through over-enthusiasm and lack of coolness near goal. Spratt was closely attended the whole afternoon and never really succeeded in breaking through. Cross was perfectly safe in goal.

For Bradfield, the whole team seemed a little on the light side. No forward looked really dangerous, and Kingsley was seldom able to rid himself of Rimell. The left-half, Buckingham-Jones, was always in evidence both in defence and in attack. Le Mare, in goal, played well but never seemed altogether happy with the bouncing ball. Both backs were good, but they had a trying time in the last ten minutes and only just succeeded in holding their men.

After the match, E. A. Bishop and P. S. Godden mi. were awarded 1st XI colours, and E. C. Whitley ma., E. L. Williams and J. A. N. Pollock were awarded 2nd XI colours.

On a slippery ground and with a wet ball Charterhouse fared badly against the R.Es. In the first half Charterhouse moved very slowly to the ball and missed at least three chances which seemed certain goals. Owing to the right-hand side of the field bunching too much, the ball could not be swung about enough, and poor marking resulted in the two R.E. goals. In the second half Godden ma. changed places with Spratt and this arrangement seemed to bring about an improvement. Soon Charterhouse was pressing hard, but the forwards missed many chances, their final shots going constantly astray, and despite some good movements on the left-wing, they failed to score. The defence played much more steadily in the second half, clearing and tackling well although the ball was wet and slippery; the passing of the halves, however, was often inaccurate. The R.Es scored once more owing to a bad muddle in front of goal and Charterhouse lost 0—3.

CHARTERHOUSE v MALVERN

At Home. Wednesday, December 1st. Lost 0—3.

This was a disappointing match for Charterhouse as they had more than their share of the game, but still suffered from penalty-area paralysis, which not only prevented them from scoring but also prevented them from ever looking really dangerous. Malvern, on the other hand, always looked dangerous on their sudden break-aways after a period of pressure and snapped up well all chances of scoring. The Charterhouse defence helped to make these rushes even more dangerous by playing very square and thus having practically no depth for recovery. They met a fast-moving forward line and generally contrived to keep it in check except for the three complete penetrations which produced the three goals.

Malvern started off very fast and for ten minutes looked extremely formidable. Charterhouse, however, weathered the storm and then applied pressure which produced some good chances, none of which were taken. Pollock had a lot to do on the left-wing but his shooting was erratic. Godden ma. had his chances too, but was temporarily incapacitated by a jarred ankle, which, incidentally, would have been avoided if he had shot sooner. Spratt was nearly always unmarked but was seldom given the ball. Malvern then broke away and Bourcier, their captain, at inside left ran nearly half the length of the field at great speed and scored with a well-directed shot, chiefly owing to lack of covering by the backs. Another shot by the same player was well saved by Cross. There was more pressure by Charterhouse and then half-time.

After half-time very largely the same situation occurred, except that Malvern had more of the game territorially, though they were not usually very near the Charterhouse goal. The Charterhouse mid-field play was still excellent but somehow the forwards always contrived to break down at the critical moment, and the passing was often poor. Malvern's second goal came from the outside-left, Hughes-Morgan, who collected a weak clearance and scored rather surprisingly from a very narrow angle. Charterhouse still fought on pluckily and had their chances. Spratt missed several of these by failing to control the ball when unmarked and in a good shooting position before goal. Rimell was now doing great things and started many promising attacks from which no tangible results occurred. The third Malvern goal followed an unfortunate and surprising blunder by Cross, who took his eye off a slow ground shot and failed to gather it cleanly. For the last quarter of an hour Charterhouse still tried hard but failed to put in a really testing shot. For Malvern the inside-left and the left-half, Beeson, were always conspicuous. The defence marked closely and never looked likely to be penetrated, the forward line moved fast and could shoot.

For Charterhouse, the forward line lacked understanding and seemed reluctant to shoot; it is a sad fact that the opposing goalkeeper never had a hostile shot to save. Rimell played really well in the second half and Whitley worked as hard as ever, but found his inside too fast for him on several occasions. Bishop was always efficient, if somewhat clumsy; his heading was excellent. The backs kicked well, but played horribly square. Cross had little to do, but produced one good save and one bad blunder.
