Potato growing concerns the whole School. On a 10-acre scale most of the work has to be done by hired machinery, but occasionally mass turn-outs are necessary for various operations. Last year's work left something to be desired: several rows were omitted or badly planted, and the last few days of gathering left 3 tons (worth £,20) to be collected afterwards ruined of course by birds and exposure. The problem is a simple one on a farm where one man can run the show; in a school, where the masters and senior boys have many calls, a higher degree of sensible co-operation is essential. In the future it will be impossible to obtain manure in quantity, and to maintain fertility the School will have to manufacture some 100 tons of compost This is quite possible, but it means that energetic parties will have to go afield cutting material and that the pioneers will have to make an array of pits properly equipped with concrete drainage and ventilation channels. Then follows periodic "turning" which has got to be done systematically and thoroughly. Lastly, there is spreading.

Fuel has been the special task of the pioneers and their most considerable work. As soon as war was declared we started to collect the many dead trees lying about the copses. At first, with limited equipment and few boys, we used block-and-tackle to hoist the trunks to the path, whence followed a laborious haul and finally sawing, splitting and delivery. The first Christmas, after much effort, saw 5,000 logs-a mere flea-bite compared with the estimated demand. Next came the construction of apparatus to top the Northbrook level in one operation; finally the construction of a trailer and sundry equipment by means of which the timber, now lowered to river level, could be got home quickly via Racquets Court Hill. We soon found that the timeenergy ratio of collection to actual log production was something like 9 to 1, and as the demand increased it became more and more difficult to keep pace with the saw benches. Incidental requirements extended the range of work. A storage hut could be built only by learning to quarry the Bargate and making the hut of stone, which, in turn, demanded water and sand, only to be obtained by further improvisations and labour. The work has gone on continuously ever since, save for one hectic month when all our energy was concentrated on bucket hoists, mud, pile-driving and the collection of revetting. Two holiday camps have been held and the School has now received no less than 135,000 logs: we may reach a quarter million before supplies run out (unless the van falls to bits).

As to emergency demands, anything of course may befall us, and the occasion when we did receive a military SOS was one that brought credit to the School. But it requires no great effort of imagination to visualize possibilities and to see the importance of getting boys accustomed to working in groups, with serious intention, technical efficiency and despatch, particularly when the urgency of the occasion has none of the obvious characteristics of heroic challenge. The kind of efficiency we achieved when a group of pioneers was suddenly sent off to sandbag the Founder's tomb was quite admirable and good practice for more serious calls that may well lie ahead.

The all-important thing is to discard that attitude of mind which, relying on fortitude in stark emergency, pursues its pre-war fantasies, and declines to take seriously the prosaic business of persistent training in solid and sometimes tiresome work. We have already indicated that some of the routine previously allotted to School employees has been taken over, in part by the pioneers, in part by other boys and masters whose energy has been seen displayed on the immediate School surroundings; but much of course remains, and clearly labour will become increasingly scarce. We shall sooner or later get into difficulties unless the whole thing is properly planned, but it must not be supposed that a mere scheme, emanating from authority and backed by compulsion will suffice The plan of real value will emerge from an awakened School consciousness that the problem exists and must be solved by its own endeavour.

During the second half, Robinites pressed hard with the wind and slope in their favour, but, although frequently in the Weekite penalty area, seemed incapable of shooting straight; this was largely due perhaps to a stubborn defence by Rodd and Smith, who both cleared well up their wings, and Rimell, who largely dominated the play in the second half. Bishop was conspicuous for Robinites in attacking now, and Albu and Price made several clever movements together down the right wing. It was not surprising however that extra time was needed to produce a result, as neither side inspired their supporters with any hope of their scoring.

Robinites scored in the first half of extra time; the ball went out to Albu on the wing, who was completely unmarked—he kept his head well and put in a lovely shot in the top corner of the goal. The last minute of play provided tremendous excitement, with Weekites pressing desperately in a scrimmage right in the Robinite goal mouth; Bishop, however, managed to clear the ball away before the final whistle blew amidst scenes of terrific excitement and anxiety both on the field and on the touch-line.

THE FOOTBALL SEASON, 1941-42

What with increasing difficulties in finding matches, travelling facilities and footballs and bladders, coupled with a prolonged ice age after Christmas which prevented any match being played in normal conditions and culminating with the cancellation of the Winchester match, the review is bound to be a little jaundiced. However, before Christmas the situation was briefly as follows:—The only School Matches possible were against Bradfield, which resulted in victories both at home and away, and against Wellingborough (won 7-1). Other creditable victories were against the Corinthian Casuals and the Sherwood Foresters. However, some very tough obstacles cropped up which caused more than a mere stumble. The Coldstream Guards beat us 6-0: they were an imposing team of very large and very active men. Another feature of the season was a contest against a Naval team from Portsmouth as a culmination of the Godalming Warships Week. These sailors were not so large but amazingly fast and were probably the best side that has visited Charterhouse for some time. The score was something like 7—1 against. They appeared supported by a gale and also the F.A. Cup, which was kindly lent by the holders, Portsmouth F.C., for the occasion. Mr Chignell took up a strong position in the aura of this imposing object and endeavoured to sell Savings Certificates. However, as stated before, the weather was not helpful either to him or the players. A remarkable kick by the Godalming mayoral toe to open the proceedings should not be allowed to pass

Girdlestoneites then won the House Matches fairly comfortably against Verites.

After Christmas, it froze. Matches were played, or rather, clattered through, on a series of concrete-like grounds. The match ν Sandhurst O.C.T.U. was very nearly normal and resulted in a draw 0—0, but all the others were very, very artificial affairs. The final blow was the scratching of the Winchester match owing to persistent ice on their arena. Naturally, it thawed the very next day.

Before Christmas the team was fairly effective but rather rough and crude. Sword proved a great find as a 'stopper' centre-half, and his heading was always outstanding. Blanchard and Towers were a fast pair of backs but not always reliable in their kicking and tackling. Of the wing halves, Le Gallais always played coolly and intelligently: Holder worked hard but his judgment of tackles is at times faulty. Also he has a bad habit of launching himself desperately at an opponent. The forwards combined well and Lahaye was

always dangerous owing to his speed. Evans improved a great deal as the season progressed. Larking and Lovett played intelligently as insides, and Lomas had his moments at outside-right, but usually lacked dash. Benké in goal lost confidence badly and seemed unable to keep his head down when taking a shot. The inevitable result was that things went wrong.

After Christmas, the gaps were filled by Bendit in goal, and by Metcalfe and Watson as backs, who developed into a very sound pair. Seager came in as inside-left and Larking went to outside-left, and Evans returned to the centre. There was a marked contrast in this arrangement, as the side played far better football, but were lacking the thrust which really gets results. The finish of the forwards was always feeble, but their tactics often excellent. However, given proper conditions they would have developed into a very decent side and it would have been most interesting to have had a comparison with Winchester.
