

Rimell ma. in form was a joy to watch, for he struck the ball very hard and very often! His priceless 29 at Eton will always be remembered by those who were present.

Rimell mi. had a promising season. As an opening bat or in the middle of the team he acted as a buttress against any collapse. He played with cool confidence and skill in several awkward situations. His 41 against the experienced bowlers of the Fire Service, his 43 against Wellington and his 55 against Harrow, to say nothing of his steady defensive innings at Eton, were all great achievements of which he may be proud.

May, at the age of 14, seemed to be irrepresible. Once he had gained his place in the side, he never looked back, and time after time more than justified his inclusion at such a tender age. His brilliant century against Harrow was, we hope, an earnest of things to come!

Bishop, Cranstoun and Walters were capable of good deeds and proved themselves worthy reserves on more than one occasion. Whitby and Fenwick had few opportunities but they made the most of them. Whitby shapes well on fast wickets but he still has to learn how to play on slow ones. Fenwick, if not elegant, was effective both in attack and defence.

The fielding of the side improved gradually and in July was really worth watching. The running between the wickets by the younger members of the team caused many heart-pangs—it will not always be possible to defeat Eton by four wickets and have two batsmen run out!

Ashley was a successful leader of a successful team—and he would not wish for a better compliment!

The match was played on what was really the first fine afternoon of the quarter and ended in a comfortable win for Charterhouse. Practically all the 'football' occurred in the first half, but throughout Charterhouse were noticeably quicker on to the ball and this repeatedly gave them the advantage in tackles and passing. Charterhouse pressed almost from the start and Vlasto was twice sent away on the right wing. On the second break-through he was only prevented from scoring by a good piece of goal-keeping by Ronaldson, who played excellently throughout and who always seemed in the right place. The Charterhouse halves were putting in some lovely long swinging passes which always had the Bradfield defence in difficulties owing to their slowness. After a good deal of pressure in which Charterhouse shot ineffectively, Godden scored from close range. Shortly afterwards Wilson was sent away and shot hard from about fifteen yards. The goalkeeper only partly stopped it and the ball was hustled in, though it appeared to be over the goal-line before the position was consolidated. Bradfield still strove hard but their attack never got going and Le Bas in goal did not have to stop a shot the whole afternoon. Soon afterwards Vlasto received a hard kick on the head and promptly retaliated by a good run down the wing and an accurate centre which was put in by Godden. So at half-time Charterhouse were leading 3—0 and going well.

After half-time the game rather collapsed. For about ten minutes Bradfield exerted pressure but never really looked dangerous. They then appeared to concentrate largely on defence and the game slowed up and became distinctly scrappy. Indeed nothing of note occurred until Rimell ma., who had transferred to outside-left with a damaged ankle, found himself in a scoring position from a pass from the right, and scored the fourth goal. There was no further score or incident thereafter.

For Bradfield the goal-keeper put up a very sound display and had no chance with any of the goals, except possibly the second. The rest of the team were obviously upset by the liveliness of the ball but failed to go after it or make up their minds fast enough. The Charterhouse half-back line was the really dominant feature of the game and this

was the chief reason for the subdued Bradfield attack. Both Godden and Price played excellently at insides, though the latter seems to have lost his shooting. The dribbling was excellent, though sometimes overdone. Vlasto was a definite success at outside-right. Pollock played better than of late but was still somewhat slow and half-hearted. Rimell mi. at back always looked safe and competent. Cranstoun's kicking was lofty and erratic but his positioning has improved and his speed was useful. Le Bas had a peaceful afternoon.

This was perhaps one of the best games played this quarter. Although under greasy conditions, the game however showed a surprising turn of speed, with both sides being quick on to the ball. A lobbing shot from an oblique angle gave Le Bas no chance and our opponents scored their first goal only ten minutes after the game had started. But Charterhouse were having more than their fair share of the game and the forwards were pressing harder. Their shooting also seemed to have improved, for several shots were put in which severely tried the goal-keeper, who played a grand game throughout. At half-time the score was still 1—0, but nevertheless we felt there was yet plenty of time for our luck to change. However, until only just over five minutes were left the game continued to rage from one end of the field to another. Waddell, playing at left-half for Rimell ma. who had damaged his ankle, and Fenwick were both playing well up with the attack and putting in excellent long passes to the wing forwards. Thus the defence work devolved chiefly on the centre-half and the backs, who were quite equal to the task, choking each attack by their quickness on to the ball, although Bishop had received a nasty crack on the head early on which left him somewhat dizzy. Then right at the end a fine centre by Vlasto gave Spratt his chance to head the ball into the corner of their goal (1—1). Our opponents, however, rallied and their centre-forward, receiving a good through pass, slipped the ball past Le Bas from a narrow angle. They were again leading and only three minutes to go, but luck was with us; for a brilliant save by their goalkeeper only led to a further centre by Vlasto and a scrimmage in front of the net, which gave Whettem the equalizing goal. No further score occurred, and two minutes later the whistle sounded and the game ended with both sides having enjoyed a hard fought game and satisfied with the result.

After nearly twenty-four hours' rain the Bradfield ground was not as heavy as feared, and Charterhouse soon settled down. From the kick-off the forwards ran right through the Bradfield defence and Spratt only just failed to score. Charterhouse were helped by the wind and, as in the previous match, were considerably quicker than their opponents.

They had most of the game in the opening quarter of an hour and tested the goalkeeper, who again played admirably. Pollock sent in one especially powerful shot which he did well to save. Then, from a move started by Cranstoun, Spratt scored from close range. Ronaldson saved well continually, but Charterhouse were going very fast and kept up pressure from which a number of corners resulted. The corner-kicking was a feature of the game, and from one of these Godden scored. Vlasto then had a chance and shot forcefully, but another good save was seen. Bradfield were chiefly in their own half but occasional raids took place and one or two favourable opportunities were missed by poor finishing. One strong shot by Bambridge was well saved by Le Bas, who played soundly throughout. Jones at outside-left often looked menacing but the other forwards were generally safely held. Eventually a third goal was scored by Spratt from a movement via Godden and Vlasto. There were several more corners given away by Bradfield and after another hard shot by Vlasto, again brilliantly stopped, half-time was sounded with Charterhouse leading three love.

After half-time the effect of the wind was felt and Bradfield pressed. The wind seemed to freshen and a little rain fell. From the kick-off an exact repetition of the opening kick-off took place; Charterhouse ran right through, but again failed at the last minute. Bradfield still went on conceding corners—there must have been about fifteen altogether, but though they were all excellently kicked, none were converted into goals. Bradfield were now moving quicker, and Hoare got the better of Price who had a very happy first half. The game became extremely fast and Le Bas did very well to save a hard drive from Wright. Fenwick was often conspicuous for his spirited attack, and he put in several shots. After about twenty-five minutes' play, Bambridge scored for Bradfield with an excellent shot which gave Le Bas no chance. Spratt retaliated by breaking away but shot over the goal from very close. About five minutes before time Wright was left unattended and scored with a powerful drive. The game continued very fast until the end, but neither side could add to their score.

Charterhouse certainly deserved their win, and if only the inside forwards could shoot they might have scored a lot more goals, as the Bradfield defence was frequently floundering. Apart from scoring, Godden played a very good game and was always most dangerous. Price was apt to retain the ball too long in the second half. All the halves played well and Waddell was a very competent sub. for Rimell ma. Cranstoun gave his best display so far this season, and kicked a good length as well as being quick into his tackles. Both Rimell mi. and Le Bas were sound and safe.

If only more goals could be scored, this year's team would be really good, as the teamwork and backing up are very satisfactory and there is plenty of attacking spirit in it.
