With only ten minutes to go Robinites retaliated with even more vigour and the closing moments of the game saw Robinites continually in the Saunderite circle, the latter's determination and stubborn defence enabling them to hold out until the final whistle.

Of individual players-for Saunderites-Robertson's excellent play at centre-half broke up the Robinite attacks and his unfailing ball control enabled him to intercept the opposition's passes with ease.

For Robinites Francis, at centre-half, was indefatigable, and was conspicuously successful in keeping the Saunderite forwards, and in particular the always dangerous Walters, out of the Robinite circle.

HOCKEY SEASON, 1944

The season opened with five old colours, and much promise from a new forward line that in early practices seemed to combine well and display plenty of thrust and initiative. Yet as in 1943, performance was disappointingly uneven. Most of our defeats were brought about by an inability to score in the circle, since in every match Charterhouse were more on attack than defence. It cannot be too strongly emphasized that the very first and paramount qualification of a good forward is the ability to shoot quickly, hard and

constantly, when in the circle. In practices nearly every forward showed this ability, but in matches easy opportunities were missed again and again.

The defence settled down early in the season to play solid, reliable hockey, partly no doubt inspired by confidence that behind them was always Carter, who in goal played several brilliant matches and never a bad one. An unerring instinct for when to come out, an almost fearsome clearance with both boot and stick, and great courage and determination marked his play, whilst his few lapses were amply atoned for by innumerable brilliant saves. At left-back Ashley was always solid, though slow in turning when beaten. He cleared well and passed with judgment, and improved considerably when he finally abandoned the bad habit of stopping the ball with the hand. Henshaw, moved from the half-line to right-back half-way through the season, played with consistent determination and growing confidence. At centre-half Robertson, entering the side only after the Winchester match, immediately proved himself the outstanding player of the season. He has every quality of the centre-half, not least of which is ubiquity. His ballcontrol on difficult fields was always a pleasure to watch. Funnell and Rickman filled the outside-half positions well, both marking closely and tackling with determination at all times.

The forward line was less satisfactory, and despite many changes and experiments no really effective combination was discovered. Dix-Perkin (Capt.) on the right wing started the season brilliantly, but later developed the bad habit of playing out of position to an increasing extent. There is no doubt that over-keenness and the anxieties of captaincy adversely affected his play. At his best his speed, stick-work and shooting were outstanding. what inexperienced as a captain, he nevertheless showed much initiative and common sense, but chiefly an exemplary keenness. Walters at centre-forward played soundly and consistently. He was always hard-working, with moments of near brilliance. Possessing plenty of hockey instinct, he never quite justified his ability in the circle, but on balance was the best forward.

The season as a whole, with three wins, a draw and five defeats, though not distinguished, was an enjoyable one. Though the plea of bad grounds must not be used as a defence for indifferent play, it remains true that so long as Broom and Lees cannot be adequately rolled and cut the standard of Charterhouse hockey will hardly improve, because so little experience can be gained lower down the School, as anyone who has watched the conditions under which the Colts games are played must agree. As a result players come into the first game practices with little hockey experience and many bad faults. Radical improvement in refereeing in junior games would produce inestimable benefits. The second handicap remains an insoluble one at present, namely the problem of players coming into the hockey side from football after the Winchester match. This season two old colours were only available for the latter half of the season. A frank recognition by players of both games that this situation does constitute a major problem in team-building, and a determination to face the problem with mutual goodwill, are essential for the the future welfare of both games, which should and can well be made complementary to each other's success.

FENCING

PUBLIC SCHOOLS FENCING CHAMPIONSHIPS

These were held in London on April 14th and 15th, four Carthusians entering—B. W. Seaman for the Junior Foil; M. J. Amberg and J. R. Josselyn for the Senior Foil and Epée; and M. J. Amberg and D. D. Watson for the Sabre. The standard of fencing was on the whole high, and Watson, considering his size and age, is to be congratulated on his performance in the Sabre, since he reached the second round. But the highest tribute should be paid to Amberg, who was the winner of the Foil and the Sabre and gained fourth place in the Epée, thus earning fifteen points for Charterhouse towards the Graham-Bartlett Cup. The only other school to score as many points was Dulwich, who also scored fifteen. As Dulwich had two in every final, the cup went to them. Amberg was fencing very well indeed in the Foil, losing only one fight throughout the match. In the Epée he was also in excellent form, and considering that he has never concentrated on the epée as much as he has on the foil and sabre, his place was comparable to his other successes. In the Sabre Amberg had to fight as hard and as skilfully as he could to gain first place, which he did after having to fight in a separate round of four after the finals.

The loss of Amberg is a sad one for Charterhouse Fencing; but his latest success was a great ending to the fencing career at Charterhouse of one of the keenest, most able and most patient Captains of Fencing it has ever had.
