#### FOOTBALL SEASON, 1943-44

The season opened with three old colours and quite a few ayers who had gained experience in 1943. However, players who had gained experience in 1943. it became clear that the scoring of goals was going to be a problem. The defence settled down fairly quickly, and the half line, Rimell ma., Bishop and Whitley ma., remained unchanged throughout the season. The backs, Lovesy and Williams, tended to cover inadequately and too slowly, and this was the fault which led to the defeat by Malvern 0—3, after Charterhouse had had the majority of the game. Cross in goal developed steadily throughout the season and became a really good performer on low shots, though his lack of height was always a handicap on high ones. Another serious fault in the side was the extreme reluctance of its members to get rid of the ball quickly enough, as well as their working the ball in the direction they intended to pass instead of opening up the game. And so it must be sadly admitted that the only victory before Christmas was against Bradfield at home: two matches, one of them against Bradfield away, were drawn, and all the rest lost. The Sandhurst side which came down was most instructive as it contained two professional internationals as well as numerous other very able players. At least two matches, those against Chelsea Sea Scouts and the Corinthian-Casuals, should never have been lost.

After Christmas Godden ma. and Williams had gone, and the forwards were again rearranged. Crole-Rees moved to centre-forward, and Price came in at inside-right, Spratt returning to the wing. This arrangement was immediately more successful, chiefly through Price's having the idea of swinging the ball about and switching the direction of the Crole-Rees was far more effective in the centre, while Spratt was happier on the wing. Robertson ma. came in at left-back and became a very reliable performer, getting quickly into his tackle. The results after Christmas were four victories, one draw and one defeat, both Eton and Winchester being defeated, 3—1 and 3—0, respectively. The defence was still slow in covering at times, and tended to have dangerous periods of immobility or thoughtlessness, but rose nobly to the occasion in the Winchester match.
