

This year, for the first time, we ran against the Tyrian Club on their own course over Putney Heath and Wimbledon Common. Unfortunately, the course, which is about 4½ miles in length, was entirely unmarked and in many places extremely hard to follow. This seriously handicapped the Charterhouse team, many of whom were relying on a fast finish, and resulted in Cunningham, Rattray and Dunstan-Croney running an extra quarter of a mile over difficult plough land and wading a stream.

Bearing this in mind, the Charterhouse team did very well indeed to obtain practically every place of importance after the first three Tyrians who are members of the Tyrian Club's best team. Hardy, who started fast, ran excellently and was unlucky to have the worst of a very close finish. He was followed up by a strong pack of Carthusians who were, however, unable to affect the final result.

These two had a long tussle for the lead, until Hardy finally secured it on the bypass, and went on to finish in another excellent time. Robertson, after his usual somewhat slow start, caught up, and ran a good race. Smith, after falling back badly, managed to speed up in the last two miles and finished seventh after a close fight with Robinson (T.) and Evans (T.) the opposing captain. The match was noticeable for the close packing between the third and tenth places.

CHARTERHOUSE v BRADFIELD COLLEGE AND SANDHURST R.A.C. O.C.T.U.

It was agreed that, from this match, two results should be obtained, one of the triangular between Bradfield, Sandhurst and Charterhouse, and the other of a straight match between Bradfield and Charterhouse, obtained by ignoring the places of the Sandhurst team. Most unfortunately the officials of the course became badly confused, and only the places with names of the first ten men home are therefore known with absolute certainty. The Sandhurst course has been entirely altered since our previous match in November. The new course is a great deal flatter, and, in length, is a bare four miles instead of the old four and three-quarter miles. The team was badly jolted during the journey to Sandhurst, which was made in an army lorry. This had grievous effects on the performances of Robertson, Cunningham and Blower, who, if in good form, might well have made a very close match into a decisive all-round win for Charterhouse.

With the exception of a short stretch of less than half-a-mile, the Epsom course which is a few yards over five miles in length is over open downs, and, although continuously hilly, has no very steep gradients.

Smith took the lead from the start and kept some way ahead for about three miles until Holloway drew up during the ascent of two long hills. For the next mile they continued to run level until Smith finally drew away in the last mile.

No Carthusian was able to help fill the longish pause after Holloway's finish or break up the fairly tight Epsom pack which followed it.

HOUSE BOXING COMPETITION, O.Q., 1943

Col. H. P. Jameson, owing to illness, was unfortunately unable to attend, his place being very kindly taken by Major Morris. Lieut. Lambert judged the House boxing, aided by the two instructors. The standard of School boxing was fairly high, with some moments of brilliance; but, on the whole, more spirit than skill was exhibited. It

is hoped that in the future there will be more opportunities for showing Charterhouse boxing skill. Major Morris presented the cup to A. C. Robertson ma., the captain of the winning house.
