This quarter, Wilderness is being dug up and fenced in for vegetables. The three farthest football grounds in Northbrook are being ploughed for potatoes.

A large number of Carthusians spent a part of the holidays working on the land. In addition to the various organised camps, reports of which appear on other pages, quite a number of fellows stayed with individual farmers, and a few went to lumber camps in Scotland and Wales. Owing to mumps and measles all the camps had to be subject to quarantine restrictions, and many of them were postponed until the end of the quarantine period. Those which did start at the beginning of the holidays were attended only by those who had had both diseases.

Owing to A.R.P. restrictions and the difficulty of arranging entertainments it is considered impossible to have School entertainments in Hall this quarter. A system of House plays has been evolved, however, whereby each House produces a short play in Hall before members of the House and a select committee of judges. The three best plays selected by the judges will, it is hoped, be produced before the whole School on the last Saturday of the quarter. Expenses, outside of the purchase of books, must not exceed 7s.6d., and the play may not last more than 45 minutes. No help may be got except from boys in the House, apart from advice in the choice of the play.

There has unfortunately been very little contact between Charterhouse and the Club at Charterhousein-Southwark. It is hoped, however, that the Seniors will be able to come to Godalming on November 9th.

Last quarter, subscriptions amounted to £60 11s.6d. In the last quarter in which subscriptions were compulsory, L.Q. '36, the total was £97 9s.6d. In L.Q. '39, the total was £80 4s.6d.; in S.Q., £76 14s.9d.; in O.Q., £70 10s.3d.; and in L.Q. '40, £63 19s.4d. There are indications that the total this quarter will be higher than that reached last quarter.

A Free-will Offering scheme has been started in the School, such as now exists at a great number of churches. The scheme enables members to decide in advance how much they will contribute during the Quarter to the various charities, and to make a regular weekly offering of a portion of this sum through a box in Chapel. For some time the Charterhouse charities have been suffering somewhat because of the more ephemeral or 'topical' calls upon the School Offertories: this scheme will ensure a steady support for the charities to which the School has been subscribing for many years. The striking response with which the scheme has met suggests that many have felt the need for putting 'charity' on a more regular and calculable footing.

We welcome St John's School, Battersea, to Lockites. They have taken over the hashrooms on the north side of Hall.

We welcome also the medical students from St. Thomas's Hospital, who are at the Manor House, and who are using our Science Laboratories.

MUSEUM

Largely, as a result of a generous grant by the Carthusian Society, the cloister to the west of Museum has been enclosed and now provides both a workroom for the Curator and also a store room for objects which are not at the moment on exhibition. The work was put in hand shortly before the declaration of war, but fortunately this did not prevent its completion. The redecoration of Museum which was intended has not, however, been possible. The removal of a certain number of cases to the new annexe has lessened the overcrowding of both the Arts and Nature Sections, and it is hoped that anything that has been lost in the slight diminution of the number of exhibits at any one moment is more than compensated by the increasing visibility of those actually on show.

Two large cases have been retransferred from the Arts to the Nature Section. In one of them the collection of local fossils is being arranged by R. A. Savill (D), who hopes to continue the work although he has now left and joined H.M. Forces: in the other, local butterflies and moths are being arranged according to date and locality by P. Spencer (P) and L. A. Maitland (P).

For some time past the Curator has been renovating and rearranging according to habitat the excellent collection of British birds which Charterhouse owes very largely to the purchase fifty years ago by Godalming friends of the School of the Stafford collection. The birds are now being mounted in large cases, and the whole of those at the ends of the room are now complete, as also is the lower tier along the south side. Two cases of the upper tier (one of them generously presented by J. L. Smith-Dampier) are also in position, containing, respectively, game birds and waders, and it is hoped that, as funds become available, the remaining five cases will be added for the birds which are so far without a new home. The individual cases have been photographed by W. T. S. Digby-Seymour (W), and the prints, with a list of names attached, are to be framed and used as keys to the contents of the cases. The Curator has received a great deal of help in the general work of Museum from A. N. P. Gandell (G).
