Regiment in 1884, but in 1886 transferred to the Indian Staff Corps, and later to the 10th Bengal Lancers. first active service was in the Burma campaign of 1885-6, and he was mentioned in despatches for his services on the North-West Frontier in 1897, and again on the Tirah Expedition, 1897-8. For his work as Cantonment Magistrate during the plague of 1903, he received the Kaisar-i-Hind Medal (1st Class): to this in 1909 was added a clasp, after he had acted as a Special Relief Commissioner during the Haidarabad Flood. In the early days of the Great War he was a Red Cross Commissioner in France, and later raised and commanded the 21st Service Battalion of the Middlesex Regiment. Placed on the retired list in 1915, he served in the Military Intelligence Department at the War Office from 1916 to 1919. He was mentioned again in despatches and in 1919 was awarded the C.M.G. He had been a J.P. for Tiverton since 1928 and for Devonshire since 1930.

WARD .-- On April 25th, 1944, at Exmouth, Robert Stanley Ward, aged 68

After farming for a few years in North Devon, he was obliged by his wife's ill-health to give it up, and devoted himself to work in Exmouth for the Church and for local charities. At the time of his death he was Vice-Chairman of the Exmouth Hospital.

Warming.—Killed as the result of air operations, P/O. Christian Stuart Warming, R.A.F., aged 32. Lockites, O.Q. 1925—O.Q. 1929.

WILSON.—Died of wounds received in action in Normandy, in July, 1944, Capt. Humphrey Peter Bowstead Wilson, Royal Artillery, aged 28.

A member of the Shooting Eight, on leaving he went up to Pembroke College, Cambridge. His father was also a Saunderite.
