While in Oxford he published 'Studies in English Rhymes' (1923); and in 1927 the 'Short History of English' was almost entirely rewritten, in the light of more recent research, much of it his own. In 1932 'The Universal Dictionary of the English Language' appeared and was warmly welcomed. Primarily etymological in design, it is also fully definitive; and the conciseness and clearness of its definitions, and the illustrative sentences, whose naturalness and raciness really do illustrate, add to its value. As well as these larger works Professor Wyld published a number of monographs and articles in periodicals both English and foreign.

Professor Wyld was a man of varied interests, and of wide knowledge beyond the subjects to which most of his teaching and research were given. His written style has been compared with that of another lexicographer, Dr. Johnson, not in Latinity, but in vigour, clarity and balance. As a lecturer he was always lucid, forcible and enthusiastic. He was sometimes a little alarming to nervous undergraduates who did not know him; but, though he never suffered fools gladly, he was immensely generous of his time and knowledge. He had the gift of imparting to others a share of his own sense of the dignity of and delight in true scholarship. His knowledge of English literature was extensive and deep, from the earliest English poetry to the most recent detective fiction. He had a finely perceptive ear for sound and rhythm; and many will remember his 'Popian' verse.

In his younger days he was a keen rider, swimmer and fisherman; latterly he was an enthusiastic gardener, and he was able to enjoy gardening both in Oxford (he made many improvements in the beautiful Fellows' Garden at Merton) and in his country home at Alvescot. It is difficult to deal and the transfer of the state to decide whether he was more characteristically himself in academic dress, or wearing his favourite old garden hat, with a bunch of raffia straying from his pocket. He had many friends, and thoroughly enjoyed company and conversation. In his later years, unfortunately, he was handicapped by increasingly poor eyesight. Perhaps those who worked with him most will remember him best as a scholar and lover of scholarship—one who was always on the alert for discovery and fresh interpretation.
