served as a Captain in the London Regiment and in the R.A.F., he became a poultry farmer.

Watson.—On July 2nd, 1945, at Rupert's Guard, Henley-on-Thames, Major John Hugh Watson, aged 68. Saunderites, O.Q. 1890—L.Q. 1893.

The third and youngest of the Carthusian sons of Sir John Watson, V.C., G.C.B., he joined the Indian Staff Corps in 1897, and the 13th Bengal Lancers (known as 'Watson's Horse' after his father) in 1898. He served in the North-West Frontier Campaign of 1897-8, in the South African War, and in the Great War in which he was twice wounded and twice mentioned in despatches, and received the Order of the Crown of Roumania. He retired from the Army in 1919. His only son was in Robinites. The death of his eldest brother was reported in *The Carthusian* for July, 1944, and a notice of his second brother appeared in our last number. All three died in little over the year.

Wells.—On July 26th, 1945, killed on active service, S.E.A.A.F., Flight Lieut. Sydney Wiltred Wells, aged 27. Daviesites, O.Q. 1931—S.Q. 1936. He had been for five years on active service.

WRIGHT.—On October 12th, 1945, at Tower House, North Ferriby, East Yorkshire, Horace Vipan Wright, J.P., aged 76. Lockites, O.Q. 1882—O.Q. 1884.

The younger of two Lockite brothers, he had three sons in Gownboys, two of whom were Head of the School.

HOUSE SINGING

This competition produced a really good concert, and the judge Mr. Topliss Green, was genuinely surprised and pleased. It was refreshingly free from breakdown, and even the altos, so rarely to be found in house choirs, came out nobly, one choir producing a large one, though few spotted him. The prize went to Verites, Robinites and Weekites, according to the custom of allotting it to three houses. But we imagine the judge must have had a hard task in discriminating these among so many good choirs.

HOUSE INSTRUMENTAL COMPETITION

This produced a high standard of performance, particularly on the part of the various house bands, and Mr. Draper should be very pleased with the results of his hard work.

The prize went to Hodgsonites, largely on account of a The prize went to Hodgsonites, largely on account of a fine mature performance of the Schubert Piano and Violin Sonata by McLelland and Ilbert. This, as the judge said, was an outstanding performance; but the piano-playing of Harris and the performance of the band were very strong contributory factors. Of all the bands, Girdlestoneites stood out well, and the judge especially said that their position at the bottom of the list was only due to their putting on two items instead of three—the result of a misputting on two items instead of three—the result of a misunderstanding. The judge, who had some very pleasant things to say, was Mr. John Fry.

MUSEUM

The 50th anniversary of the opening of Museum in 1891 passed, not unnaturally, unnoticed in war-time: nor is there space yet in The Carthusian for any adequate account of its present contents or tribute to the foresight and devotion of its two founders, .G S. Davies and O. H. Latter. A few

recent changes should not, however, pass unrecorded.
