Dear Frances,

It is probably just as hot in Oxford as it is here, & I'm writing to you in bed at night as I can't get to sleep (which often happens). Then later on Maurice wakes up & has to use his puffing machine, & often we have a gabfest in the middle of the night - coffee for him & hot milk for me. That puffing business is otherwise a lonesome sport & often he whiles away his time counting the cars moving around James Bay & witnessing police chases!

Last Sunday evening was the occasion of the annual Symphony Splash, which happens in the Inner Harbour with the Symphon

Orchestra set up in a big tent  
on a barge & the audience all  
around a dry land, (a some in  
little boats), I went along on my  
own on foot, & just worked my  
way into a good spot. It was a  
very black looking sky overhead  
& very windy & it was glad of all  
my wash clothes. They cut the  
program down a bit as it looked  
so threatening overhead, but we  
did get the big event of the evening —  
always the 1812 Overture with all the  
guns & bells & fireworks. All  
evening with the high wind the barge  
was swinging around on its  
moorings, & I really felt we were  
all in motion! After the Overture  
& the fireworks a lot of us started  
to move off, but the real enthusiasts  
clamored for encores & the  
orchestra went gamely on. All  
for free of course, & you just made  
a donation. The whole event is  
heavily sponsored, but is now quite  
well known & we get quite a lot of  
Venice visitors who come specially to  
be here for this. So the Orchestra  
plays "The Washington Post" for them.  
In the library recently I found a

biography of Roald Dahl. I

of his life (& others of his family)  
was centred around Great  
Missenden, where Joa used  
to live. He may not even have  
been very well liked as a  
neighbour — I don't know what
